Europeana mission








Power to the People

GALLERIES

- groups of items, which present a curated selection of images, videos or sounds on a certain theme, without any additional context or narrative
- typically feature 25-50 items and include material from multiple institutions across Europe




EUROPEANA BLOG

- short editorial pieces, no more than 300-400 words, that illuminate a topic. They feature a number of 3-5 images, sound clips or videos, normally with open licenses which facilitates more reuse within your educational activities
- the blogs are normally released on social media around important birthdays or historical events. This is an easy read for students and can bring discussion on relevant societal topics






Europeana exhibition *Celebrations in Europe* + Actionbound app


